In other words, we have to begin somewhere. FOTC hopes that this donation will help UHUK educate its children, one child at a time, and help to build schools, one brick at a time.

The cheque was handed to His Excellency by FOTC chairman Ally Clarke who then presented it to two UHUK representatives, Kathy Gebara-Johnson and Myriam Breton Jones.

It will be a long time before our fellow Caribbean island, Haiti, is restored to some semblance of the beautiful country it once was. Chairman Ally Clarke said the FOTC is committed to helping this sister island, and pray for the day when they can see for themselves the brick they paid for that helped re-build the school, bringing hope to Haiti.
